



Lori & Brad Fishel

Lori and Brad Fishel are dedicated Temple members who generously donate their time, effort, and finances to benefit The Temple and its future. Both are native Nashvillians who grew up at The Temple and have served on The Temple Board. In addition, Lori has taught Religious School, chaired various fundraisers, and serves as the current co-chair of the Development Committee and served on Rabbi Danziger's Transition Committee. They have three sons: Scott (married to Annie), Max, and Jordan.

Lori: "The reason I initially became involved in The Temple and appreciate the Temple so much is because for me it's more than simply a place of worship. It serves well as a place for worship with three impressive rabbis and a great staff, but there are so many layers of The Temple that I love in addition to that. They've done an amazing job making people feel welcome and included, from social gatherings to wonderful educational programs to community social action. One of The Temple's many strengths is that it has lots of different ways to get involved. I've also enjoyed working on Life & Legacy due to its collaborative aspects with the larger Nashville Ie

Brad: "I grew up in a much more Reform household than Lori. My grandparents on both sides of my family were members of The Temple and shaped my views and thoughts along with my parents. I'm a fifth-generation member of The Temple and my great-great grandfather, Morris Fishel, was instrumental in bringing Reform Judaism to Nashville. We've seen how The Temple has grown and how it serves the community and congregation in different ways over the years. From my work on the Temple Board, I've learned that we have great leadership, strong clergy, an inviting congregation, and a terrific facility. These are real strengths that will help us continue to attract new members and to satisfy our current members."

Lori: "Both of my parents were brought up Orthodox and my mother's parents were really a big part of my life. My grandfather was deeply religious and observant, and we grew up with his customs and practices. When I was younger, we belonged to Sherith Israel, but we joined The Temple for its religious school when I was in the third grade. My mother (Raye Ann Greenbaum) became very involved in The Temple, and my grandfather accepted it, although he was Orthodox. That's why I strongly believe in the tolerance of different religions in general, as well as the different branches of Judaism. We need religious tolerance in this world; it is important to respect everyone's beliefs. My grandfather instilled that in me. My connection to The Temple developed from my grandfather to my mother, and now my father-in-law (James Fishel) and I have a wonderful relationship through working on the Life & Legacy initiative, so I would say the three of them are my greatest Jewish influences."

Brad: "I think Jewish fund raising is a little bit tougher job than it used to be. If you go back generations to my grandparents, they always gave money to Jewish causes. But now, Jewish people are getting involved in so many different organizations in the city and country. There are numerous options for people to consider for their donations and there's a real need to give to Jewish causes."

Lori: "I like the Jewish concept of Tikkun Olam, repairing the world. Philanthropy is important to our family. We recently established the Lori Ann Fishel Special Needs Fund that is housed at the Jewish Federation. This fund is in memory of my sister-in-law, Lori Ann Fishel. The fund is designed to enhance the lives of people with special needs. It has evolved into a wonderful fund which has been used by people both inside and outside the Jewish community. The fund has been used by The Temple to help make the playground more inclusive and to provide noise canceling headphones for the hearing-impaired. People can donate to the fund so hopefully it will continue to grow and flourish for generations to come."

Brad: "Knowing that prior generations in my family have made gifts motivates me to help Jewish organizations, especially The Temple, move forward with its capital campaigns or special projects. I just felt that it was my turn to help in some way as well. Just as prior generations set examples for me, Lori and I are setting examples for our children."


